



#### DIRECTIONS

- From the East & West (I-90, Thruway): Get off at Exit 39 onto 690
   East. Continue from #4 below.
- 2) From the South (I:81): Get off I-81 at the interchange for I-690 West (there is no exit number). Continue from #4\*\*\*.
- 3) From the North (I-81): Get off at exit 22ar St.) St.) and follow the signs for I-690 West. This will require that you right ight onto Route 928, Bear St., at the end of the I-81 exit ramp. Staylear St. for the better part of a mile; the on-ramp for I-690 will be strt in fin front of you. Get on I-690 West, then continue from #4 below.
  - 4) From I-690 to the site: WATCH OUT FOR EXILY RAMPRAMPS ON I-690.

From either I-690 West or I-690 East, get off at Exit 6, which will be labelled Camillus, Fairmount, Auburn. Follow the signs for FAIRMOUNT. The best way to do this is to move into the left-most lane as soon as you can and stay there. This is the world's longest exit ramp (actually, it's route 695), so be patient; it's about a mile from I-690 to the end of the ramp, where you will turn left onto West Genesee St. Go just over 1 mile on West Genesee and turn right onto Fay Rd. (which is directly across from Westvale Plaza on the left). The school will be a mile down Fay Rd. on you right. Watch for double stop signs.

Unto the Western Populace From Mistress Arianna of Wynthrope, Greetings!


Alright folks, time for me to get up on the soapbox. I'm sorry about becoming serious on you again, but I feel strongly that I have to speak out.

Sooner or later, most gentle lords and ladies in the Society decide to register a name and heraldic device with the College at Arms. You go to your local pursuivant, fill out the forms, and pay your money. But do you know what happens to your submission after it leaves your hands?

Contrary to popular opinion, your submission does not go straight to a shredder. As submissions reach the East Kingdom's Brigantia Herald from the local pursuivants, he adds them to the current month's Internal Letter of Intent (ILoI) – his letter to the other Heralds of the East, listing the devices which have been submitted that month and which he intends to send to the Laurel Queen at Arms (the Society's Corporate Herald) for registration. Each ILoI has the name, documentation, blazon (heraldic description of a device), and emblazon (drawing of a device) for 25 to 90 submissions. Getting your device onto the ILoI and into the mail to the commenting heralds takes about 4-6 weeks, depending upon when it arrives in Brigantia's mailbox.

The commenting heralds around the Kingdom, including a number of groups of heralds (the Sycamore Regional Herald and the Rhydderich Hael both have commenting groups) are given a month or so to research these submissions. What does this mean?

Submissions are given three basic considerations by the commenters. First, is the name good, documentable period practice, and allowable in the Society? Is it offensive (John Nunraper)? Does it conform to SCA rules (not more than 50 characters or three languages, and correct grammar)? If it fails any of these tests, would a small change make it okay? (Heralds really do try to help people's submissions pass when they can...) Second, is the device legal SCA heraldry? For example, it can't have color on color or metal on metal, or contain any non-period charges. Are the charges arranged in a period heraldic fashion, balanced and medieval in style? If not, is it fixable with a minor change? Thirdly, is either the name or device too similar to another existing name, device or badge? In order to decide whether or not a conflict exists, heralds look through Ordinaries (books of devices grouped by type of charge) and Armorials (books of devices arranged in alphabetic order of the people who own them). These books range from the Society's own Armorial and Ordinary to the mundane "Bible" of Arms, Papworth's.

When the commenters of the East Kingdom College of Heralds are done with their research, they write to Brigantia and tell him of their findings. He then decides whether each name and device should go on to the Laurel Queen at Arms or be returned to the submittor for revisions. Brigantia then sends the submittor a letter explaining his decision. This is usually the first time the submittor hears further about his or her submission. It has been about three or four months since the device was

submitted and, with luck, it has passed Kingdom and "gone to Laurel."

At Laurel, the Corporate level, the process listed above is repeated, but with the Kingdom Principal Heralds and other very informed and experienced heralds throughout the Society as commenters. They often have more knowledge and greater resources than local pursuivants. Laurel bases her decisions on their advice, and informs Brigantia, who then informs the submittor. This usually takes another three or four months, for a total of six to eight months.

If your name and device pass Laurel, they are yours forever. They are listed in the SCA's Armorial and Ordinary at its next printing, and they are protected from conflict by any future submissions. They cannot be "bounced" even if the rules change and they go against later heraldic practices. This is why the heralds are so cautious about what they register. Although you will hear many a tale of bounced devices and heralds' pickiness, about 80% of each month's submissions from the East pass Laurel. We can be proud of our College of Heralds and its scholarship.

Ed. Note: The following is the first in a series of articles on period foods and cooking by Lord Robin Argyll du Coeur Aile, Head of the East Kingdom Brewer's Guild. These columns were originally published in Settmour Swamp's "The Mudpuppy," but are so delightful and different from the usual cooking article that I felt them well worth the reprint. As each article deals with the foods of a different season, I'll be publishing them in their appropriate month rather than in the order they originally appeared.

### pot au feu

"Pease porridge hot, pease porridge cold, pease porridge in the pot, nine days old."

When I was growing up, somehow I never really thought about that one too much. It was sung quite gleefully, but I don't believe that anyone would really get excited about eating a nine day old cold legume sludge unless they were starving. We are discussing serious survival food here, which has NOTHING to do with luxuries like being enjoyable.

It's January now, with all of the attendant joys of coping with winter. Fresh meat is scarce, since all of the extra animals have been slaughtered to minimize the need for fodder, and most game is either hibernating or hiding. Consequently, your planning in food preserving is being put to the test. The real test comes during late February, March and early April, before the new crops can be used. Vermin and spoilage from improper preservation are two major concerns, another is water damage, yet another is human clumsiness. Since people's lives depend on good planning, it is no wonder that the position of steward was held in such high esteem.

Dried legumes are a virtual necessity in winter. They can fill out a meal which is otherwise scanty, or be the focus of it. The classic "cassoulet" is an example of filling out - lamb for six can feed twelve with enough beans and carrots and parsnips. Pease porridge is more the latter case. It can be a meal by itself, although with bread and butter, it can be a feast. Bean dishes can be stretched with any appopriate liquid without too much damage, and are nutritionally wonderful. Yes, Virginia, you CAN live on beans and rice, although you had better get your greens for vitamins, too.

At the Pennsic XIV, we had the traditional monumental rainstorm followed by hypothermia cases on Thursday night. I made up a split pea soup to combat the cold, and this is what it was:

#### feeds 4-10 depending on cold and hunger

2 lbs. split peas - they dry better if they're split - that's why they split them. Color doesn't matter.

2 qts. chicken stock - water will do in a pinch.

1 lb. kielbasa or similar sausage, diced.

1 large or 2 medium onions, diced.

1/4 cup oil - I use olive, but type is not important.

pepper and salt to taste.

In a good sized pot, saute the onions in the oil. When the onions are transparent, add the sausage and brown it. Add the stock and the peas (which you have already cleaned), bring it all to a boil, lower to a simmer, add a little salt and pepper, cover the pot and let it stew. Stir every five or ten minutes so it won't stick and burn (which beans like to do), and when the peas have pretty much broken down, it's ready. Check for uncooked peas and season to taste. It is even better the second day, but I think that nine days would be stretching it a bit. Although one never knows, do one?

But sinew, muscle, bone.


Now blood, it also served my will To gain this golden Crown Not as proof of Royal birth, But spilled upon the ground.

### regional rumours

Western Regional Twelfth Night on January 14th was a rowdy good time, if I do say so myself.
